Hardly a year after the ban on angling of mahseer came into force, a British angler has caught a giant mahseer weighing 130 lb (calculated with a mahseer weights formula) in Kodagu district. The specimen broke the six-decade old rod & reel record. The fish had an incredible girth of 99 cm (39 inches). Loughran was a guest of the "Coorg Wildlife Society" (CWS), an organisation working for "conservation of wildlife in Kodagu".

The Mahseer found in the Cauvery, is on the list of endangered species and angling is banned. The ban has neither dimmed the enthusiasm of amateur fishermen wanting to pose for the camera with their catch, nor has it has deterred organisations facilitating anglers, whose defence is that they catch and release the fish back into the river. Members of the IGFA claim that catch-and-release angling helps conservation of sport fish. It has much less impact on the environment than using nets to catch fish for research.

Especially in the first half of 2011 we were able to verify some new milestones in sport fishing. Furthermore we want to mention some older and possible records, which we discovered in 2011. In addition to our weekly updates we finished our "hunt" for the failing photos. We could add photos of 82 (!) new species since August 2011 – 81% of the profiles (57% in 2009) include a photo now. Website

The new state-of-the-art search engine is online since 1.1.2012. In a second step we will try to finance this important project of "pro-active worldwide monitoring of record catches" with useful advertising. In the second quarter 2012 we will start the new section "Where to fish" attractive for advertising partner. We will bring anglers planning a trip or searching a new destination together with tour operators, camps, lodges, fishing venues, outfitters etc.

Reminder: targets of the project

First we want to maintain a reliable, actual and complete database concerning the maximum size of freshwater fish to uplift the knowledge about fish in general (in some weeks the species profiles of www.fishbase. org and www.fishing-worldrecords.com will be directly linked).

Second, we want to show less known, large species of unexplored waters. Then angling tourists and tour operator practicing catch & release will check out these destinations. Native commercial fishermen have a new source of income through guiding. This is a chance to reduce commercial fishery and therefore protect threatened species.

Addendum to the year 2010: In spring 2011 the IGFA accepted the catch as the new all tackle record. The fish with a girth of 117 cm (46 inches) was quickly measured and weighed on certified scales, and then safely returned back into the small fishing lake.

In the wild the population of this species dropped dramatically because damming of the Mekong's tributaries has cut off its spawning grounds (river fishing for the species is actually illegal but poaching is widespread).

On the other side thousands have been stocked in fishing lakes. The fish eat algae and prefer turbid water which makes a tropical pond like this one a perfect habitat. Stuart Gillham, the lake owner, has recorded growth rates among his fish between 50 and 100 lb per year!

Recreational fishing has provided economic alternatives for many fishing communities in parts of the world. Therefore we don't refuse the booming catch & release sport fishing in Thai fishing venues.

On our opinion the most interesting catch in 2011. Despite the similarity with the Atlantic Salmon taxonomists considered it a subspecies of Salmo trutta trutta for a long time, finally Salmo caspius is accepted as a valid species. The fish was caught in the Enotaevsky district north of Astrakhan. Two further specimen were caught with the net one week later, because fishermen don't know that it is listed in the red list of Russia and Kazakhstan.

Caspian Salmon spawn mainly in the rivers of the western shore of the Caspian Sea, Kura, Terek and Aras. In the Volga it is rare nowadays. In former centuries this fish was caught commercially in large quantities. Due to overfishing and the change of habitat, the Volga strain is near extinction.

Due to the catch and release policy and decreasing commercial freshwater fishing in the United States, the best mark for Blue Catfish is improved nearly every year.

After some records from the Mississippi-Missouri River system, this specimen was caught in a dam of the Roanoke River. Anderson landed the fat fish with a 110 cm (43 inches) girth after a 45 minutes fight before dusk.

The record stood for 29 years, therefore this fish had the most publicity in 2011. Myerson was participating in an event called the Striper Cup (which he won in 2010) and landed the fish near Outer Southwest Reef in the night after a 20 minute fight. It was officially weighed in the next morning, nearly 12 hours after the catch. The giant was estimated to be over 25 years old.

Poyang Lake is hometown of 80 fish species and the Chinese River Crab, exported to Japan, Korea and Southeast Asia.

Marcelo Siqueira, a really experienced angler who caught a lot of large Redtail Catfishes estimated the weight by the measurements of the length and the incredible girth. Anyway we can't believe that the rod & reel record was nearly doubled and that this specimen exceeded the accepted maximum weight. Therefore further proofs and witnesses are necessary.

This is the largest specimen caught with rod & reel during the occupation period (2003-2011) in Iraq. It's definitely a new length record, but it was not weighed. The fish was exactly 70,5 inches long and had a girth of 39 inches. It was supposedly released alive and has been hooked a couple of times, but never landed again (looks dead at the photo...).

Although we are sure, that Mangars up to 100 kg (220 lb) were caught with rod & reel in Turkey, Iraq and Iran, we are still waiting for a welldocumented record catch. The "official" rod & reel record dates back to the British colonial period at the beginning of the 20th century! During the occupation period a lot of interesting information and photos of less known species was distributed over the WWW, this ended with the departing of the troups in December 2011.

Supposedly this beautiful Brown Trout was 120 cm(!) long with a girth of 98 cm (39 inches). The fish was not weighed, maybe it was heavier than the rod & reel world record from 2009. It's definitely the largest resident (non-migrating) Brown Trout ever caught in South America. The beauty was caught with a fly rod by Luis Antúnez, the owner of the Salmo Patagonia Lodge. The catch was witnessed by a full TV program staff which made a video for the

channel "Seasons". Mr. Antúnez is above all suspicion, but this specimen would be far longer than every other documented Brown Trout.

We were informed by Chris Appleby from the magazine "Alt om Fiske" that the famous 35,89 kg (79 lb 2 oz) catch from Henrik Henriksen, caught at the same place in 1928 was deleted from the official Norwegian record list. The fish was weighed without head and gutted and the total weight was only estimated later! In addition an extremely long gaff was used to stab the (died) fish from the bottom of the pool and lift it into the boat. It is remarkable, that this old record is still listed by the IGFA.

Although a lot of giant Salmon between 30 and 35 kg were caught with rod & reel in the first half of the 20th century, the fish left is the largest exactly weighed with photo document, as far as we know.
