CATCH OF THE YEAR 2007



Date: 30th March 2007

English name: Short-tailed River Stingray
Scientific name: Potamotrygon brachyura
Method: Sportfishing with rod & reel
Weight: 208 kg (458 lb 9 oz)

Length: approx. 150 cm (59 inches) diameter

Water: Rio Parana Country: Argentina

Angler: Mr. Humberto Minatta

This is the largest freshwater fish caught by Sportfishing with rod & reel ever - beside the anadromous sturgeon species. Larger than the Sportfishing records for catfishes, carp-like fishes, Alligator Gar and Pirarucu.

The Giant was caught near Bella Vista, two hours south of Corrientes. The fight lasts one hour during night. Four anglers and the local guide assisted Mr. Minatta with boat hooks to land it. In fact they looked for Surubi and after three specimens they hooked the ray. The record catch was accurately weighed at the old Wharf.

These rays approach at the bank of the river in shallow water during the night to eat. Especially at the mouth of brooks, because the water is cloudy there.

Potamotrygon brachyura is the second largest real freshwater ray after the Asian Himantura chaophraya. It's very unlikely, that this record will be broken from another species than a ray in the future.

NOTE FROM THE EDITOR

Dear friend of fishing and ichthyology,

welcome to the issue 2007 of your "WRFF News".

In 2007 we collected some really extraordinary catches around the world. In addition we could further improve the database and gallery. It's the first carp over 40 kg caught by Sportfishing. This wellknown specimen from a lake near Bordeaux broke it's own world records for the last time. Some days after the catch the fish was found dead.

This giant carp is the second specimen ever taken at Bung Sam Lan Lake from the five "super biggies" stocked at the lake 23 years ago. These five carp came from the Chaophraya River, where they were netted. They all weighed over 90 kg (198 lb), when sold to the lake owners.

This fat trout had a girth of 86 cm (34 inches)! The reservoir, constructed on the South Saskatchewan River in 1967, was stocked with fast growing triploid trouts. Adam and his brother Sean have caught some of the biggest non-migratory rainbow trouts in the world.

The british angler released the fish, that took him 20 minutes to catch. *Pangasius sanitwongsei*, which reaches such enormous sizes comparable to *Pangasianodon gigas*, is not threatened in the wild.

It's a new record for a new large catfish species in the Amazon River system. Brachyplatystoma capapretum was "discovered" in 2005! This means the scientists Lundberg and Akama described it as a new species. Before this, it was only considered as a colour variation of Brachyplatystoma filamentosum.

The lake is well stocked with numerous species and Pacus from 30-40 kg are regularly caught there. Maybe the best water for Black Pacus (Tambaquis) worldwide.

Contrary to numerous published photos of Spotted Sorubims ($Pseudoplatystoma\ corruscans$) in record size, photos of large $P.\ fasciatum$ are rare. This fish is not from the wild, but from a fishing lake. A photo of a larger specimen is unknown – till now.

This is the second heaviest Dorado ever caught with rod & reel and the longest Dorado by any catching method. The mounted trophy is exhibited in a restaurant in Corrientes. We also got a photo of the 31,40 kg (69 lb 4 oz) inofficial Sportfishing record, but the quality of the newspaper photo is too bad to publish.

2007 shows the same picture as 2006. We had to update only few record data, because of three reasons:

- 1) The records in the database are more accurate and reliable from year to year, so fewer corrections are necessary.
- 2) Most of the commercial fishing records and also the majority of the Sportfishing records are at the highest stage regarding the growth potential of the species. So it's very difficult today, to find new record data for species, which are in the focus of anglers around the world.
- 3) In more than 20 years we have researched Sportfishing records in 59 countries, out of 193. The rest of the world is not explored by foreign anglers from developed countries and/or the native population don't practice recreational fishing.

Following are new entries on www.fishing-worldrecords.com, marked in red in the database:

- You will find **new record weights** for Siberian Sturgeon, Yellowfin River Pellona, Cutthroat Trout, Brook Trout, Muskellunge, Amur Pike, Mangar, Giant Siamese Carp, Catla, Common Carp, Black Pacu, Dorado, *Brycon orbignyanus*, Curimbata, Giant Pangasius, Striped Wallago, Bagrid Catfish, *Brachyplatystoma capapretum*, Spot Pangasius, Trout Cod, Orinoco Peacock, Butterfly Peacock, Alligator Gar, Arawana and Shorttailed River Stingray.
- You will find new record lengths for the above mentioned species plus Stellate Sturgeon, American Shad and Northern Pike.
- You will find new record ages for Giant Siamese Carp, Dorado and Australian Lungfish.

It's the largest Brook Trout ever landed on rod & reel. The weight was estimated by the IGFA. This fish is definitely larger than the old record from 1916 and a second specimen from 1994, both where caught in the Nipigon River, Canada at a weight of 6,58 kg (14 lb 8 oz). The lake is situated in Manitoba and the catching method was trolling.

The Trout Cod looks similar to the Murray Cod, has the same distribution and hybridizes with it's close relative. Protected by law, therefore the specimen was released immediately. Talbingo Reservoir is situated in the Snowy Mountains.

Also in 2007 we got information and photos of possible records, which we don't list in the database and photo gallery. Either the information was incomplete, doubtful or the photo quality was too bad to estimate the size of the catch.

This catch made a lot of furore at the beginning of last year. The video is shown on www.youtube.com and stated as the largest catfish ever caught with rod & reel with a weight of 400 lb and a length of 259 cm. But the weight was only estimated. Maybe it exceeded the actual record of 142 kg (313 lb 1 oz) from the Xingu River.

We found out that the well known pirarucu Sportfishing record from Bung Sam Lan Lake in Thailand had "only" 185 lb and not 185 kg. The owner of the lake found the specimen some times after the catch dead, weighed it and mixed lbs and kilograms. Between the years 2000 and 2005 three other specimen where caught in Bung Sam Lan Lake with estimated weights from 110-140 kg. So we are searching a new Sportfishing record accurately measured and weighed with scales. In addition the length-weight relationship of record specimen is unclear. The 185 lb (83,91 kg) fish from Bung Sam Lan Lake was 263 cm long, on the other side we found two netted fishes from Brazil with 185 kg/255 cm and 190 kg/267 cm.

In the last years more and more catches from Ecuador, Peru and Bolivia were published, as the preasure from commercial fishing is not so high in the upper part of the Amazon River system compared to Brazil.

Search for state record lists! In all the years we found or got a lot of record lists from different countries around the world. Whether from fishing associations, Sportfishing magazines or private persons. But there is still a large number of developed countries, where we can't find an official or inofficial record list.

Europe: we are still searching record lists for Iceland, Portugal, Spain, Belgium, Italy, Slovenia, Croatia, Yugoslavia, Bosnia Herzegovina, Macedonia, Albania, Greece, Estonia, Lithuania, Romania, Bulgaria, Moldova Republic, Ukraine, Belorussia and Russia. From most of these countries we have single records for some species, but no listings.

Asia & Australia: we found only record lists for Thailand, China, South Korea, Japan, Philippines, Malaysia and Australia.

Africa: only record lists for South Africa and Zimbabwe

North- and South America: only record lists for USA, Canada, Brazil
